In addition, exposure assessments of pesticides are conducted using South African consumption data.</p> <p>The original regulation however, indicates that where food is imported into South Africa, and if MRLs are more restrictive than Codex MRLs, the Codex MRL will be accepted provided that the exposure to the population is not a risk to human safety.</p>
